## Class in Focus — Ms Hughes' Fourth Class



#### **Our Class News**

Hello everyone! We are Ms Hughes' 4<sup>th</sup> class and we are excited to show you what we have been doing throughout this school year! We have learned about so many new things this year, including the Celts, the skeleton and the bog.

#### The Bog

We have been learning about the bog during the last few months in 4<sup>th</sup> class. Ms Hughes brought in pieces of turf for us from a bog in Mayo and for some of us this was our first time to see and touch turf. We also learned about the plants and animals in the bog and did some chalk art work on a scene from the








#### Skeletons

We have been learning about the Skeleton in 4<sup>th</sup> class. There are 206 bones in an adult body. Our Skeleton protects our organs including, the heart, the brain and the lungs. We created life size skeletons by lying down on the paper and drawing an outline of one person's body and then filling in their bones.

#### The Celts

We have been learning about the Celts as part of our history lessons and have been reading the 'horrible history' book about it. Irish people are descendants from the Celts and the book has taught us about the games which the Celts invented that have survived through the ages including, 'cloth knife, stone' which is now known as 'rock, paper, scissors' and Hurley commonly known as 'Hurling'.









#### Roots of Empathy

Since October of this year we have been participating in the Roots of Empathy programme in our class. Roots of Empathy is a very special programme that helps children build empathy and develop emotional literacy. Levi has been our teacher for the year, even though he is one 1 year old and has helped us to develop and understand our own feelings and show and feel empathy.

## 4th Class History Walking Tour

At the beginning of June, our class went on a historical walking tour with local historian, David Sorensen. David brought us to lots of historical sites and told us all about the history of Balbriggan including: the founding of Balbriggan and the Hamiltons; Balbriggan's Mills; George's Square; the viaduct and arrival of the railway; the Sack of Balbriggan; the Hosiery factories; the harbour; the Banks and Maritime Balbriggan. We learnt many interesting facts about Balbriggan. For example, did you know that Balbriggan was once a town of mills? And that many children, some as young as five years old had to work in these mills! Balbriggan was also famous for its stockings and fine hosiery known as "Balbriggans". At one time, three hosiery factories were established here and their high-quality hosiery won gold medals at many international exhibitions. They even made stockings for the Queen of England!

If you would like to learn more about the history of Balbriggan, David Sorensen and co-author Petra Skyvova have written a very informative booklet entitled "Balbriggan Heritage Trail". This booklet is available at the local tourist office on George's Square.

#### How to make a school appointment

- 1. Parents wishing to speak to the school principal Ms Corcoran, in relation to their child or other school matters should do so by making an appointment through the office.
- 2. An appointment with the principal is only necessary after the parent has already liaised with the teacher and is seeking further information or if requested by the principal.
- 3. The principal and staff generally do not make phone calls to follow up on incidents which happen in school to parents.
- 4. When making such an appointment, parents must recognize that the school is a busy place and the principal is not available to meet parents immediately. However, the appointment will be made for the next available possible time. The are times reserved in the principal's day for such meetings.
- 5. This is to facilitate parents not having to come more than twice in any given day to the school. There is also time for the school to investigate the incident and respond to same. Therefore, again, reducing the number of meetings necessary to get the incident resolved in the appropriate manner.

Points 4 and 5 also apply to teachers and appointments can be requested through the child's homework journal or class Dojo.
